Cumberland County Medical Reserve Corps Update

The Medical Reserve Corps is a community-based, civilian volunteer program that helps build the public health and disaster response infrastructure of communities nationwide. MRC units help organize, train, and use local volunteers who choose to donate their time and expertise to promote healthy living and public health initiatives and prepare for and respond to public health and other emergencies. MRC volunteers supplement existing local emergency and public health resources; volunteers include medical and public health professionals and other non-medical community members who fill vital support positions.

Each MRC unit is organized and trained to address a wide range of all-hazards challenges from public health education to disaster response. As of August 2013, more than 980 MRC units and 270,000 volunteers existed nationwide. Each unit varies in size and functionality. Some MRC units are housed within local health departments (LHDs), universities, or emergency management agencies—other MRC units have organized as their own standing 501(c)3 organization. The Cumberland County Emergency Management Agency has recognized the need for a County MRC since the H1N1 outbreak in 2009. We are the largest population center ~281,000 in the State of Maine and as such have a significant need for this capability. We are partnering with the Southern Maine Regional Resource Center, the MeCDC, the American

Red Cross, Alpha One, the Maine Emergency Management Agency, the regional hospitals and the Cumberland County District Public Health Committee.

The Cumberland County Medical Reserve Corps was recognized by the US Surgeon Generals Office in September 2011. After considerable groundwork, including legislative action, to ensure that the MRC volunteers would have the appropriate liability and workers compensation was accomplished, the Cumberland County Commissioners formally approved the Cumberland County MRC in March of this year. Currently, there is a core planning group, made up of our partner organizations, working to develop the personnel resources necessary to meet our four core missions:

- Support of the MeCDC Strategic National Stockpile, Mass Dispensing – Points Of Dispensing System (PODS)
- Support of community-wide routine immunization efforts
- A Functional Assessment Services Team to support the CCEMA Regional Disaster Sheltering Initiative along with partnering with the ARC to support certain additional regional disaster sheltering needs.
- Alternate Care Sites to include supporting hospitals and a Federal Medical Station Deployment, with staffing needs.

Basic Instructional Skills (G265)

Therefore, completing the suggested practical exercises is essential to improving your skills. And being a skillful trainer is the key to empowering others with knowledge and skills.

This course is designed for state, tribal, county and local emergency management instructors; State agency partners with emergency training responsibilities are also welcome.

Regional Sheltering in Cumberland County

During localized emergency events of short duration and for a limited number of citizens, municipalities have responsible for sheltering, and are usually well prepared. "In event of a large scale emergency or disaster requiring the evacuation of hundreds or more individuals from multiple communities, where mass relocation vice integration of the displaced population is required, a more regional approach to shelter is recommended." (Jim Budway, CCEMA, 12/28/2010)

In 2011, Cumberland County Emergency Management Agency (CCEMA) began the process of surveying facilities throughout the county as possible regional shelters. The Regional Shelter concept maximizes the use of volunteers, facilities, and equipment. As approached by CCEMA, regional shelters will be able to accommodate those with functional needs, the elderly, immigrants, those with limited or no English Proficiency, faith based needs and pets.

Eleven surveys were conducted over two years and include the following shelters:

- Brunswick High School
- Falmouth High School
- Gray-New Gloucester High School
- Lake Region High School
- South Portland Community Center
- Windham High School
- Portland Expo Building
- Gorham Middle School
- Greely Middle School
- Scarborough High School
- Westbrook High School/Vocational Center

These facilities were chosen for their large capacity, vicinity of evacuation routes, ADA compliance, feeding and hygiene facilities, and ability to house pets within the facility or within walking distance.

In each survey, facility and/or administrative staff, the municipal emergency management director, CCEMA representatives, American Red Cross, an AlphaOne architect, Cumberland County Animal Response Team assisted in the survey. At many of the sites, the Portland Public Health Minority Health Access Director and Amateur Radio Emergency Services were also represented.

CCEMA appreciates the extensive work contributed by all. Each survey took about three hours, with participants looking at every aspect of each facility. Congratulations to Jill Johanning of AlphaOne for attending every one of the surveys and for her reports on ADA compliance which strengthen Cumberland County's ability to meet the needs of all individuals.

Reports are on file with CCEMA, the American Red Cross of Southern Maine and with the municipal emergency manager for the town in which the facility is located.


Sea Level Rise and Coastal Flood Impacts Viewer

The devastation caused by Hurricane Sandy is a stark reminder of the vulnerability of coastal communities to damage from storms and flooding. As efforts continue to rebuild hard-hit areas along the East Coast path of the storm, a new tool is helping people make planning decisions that take into account future sea level rise.

The sea level rise planning tool is designed to help state and local officials, community planners, and infrastructure managers understand possible future flood risks from sea level rise for use in planning decisions. Scientists from multiple federal agencies and academic institutions synthesized the best available science to create a set of scenarios of global mean sea level rise through 2100. The team considered both ocean warming and melting of mountain glaciers and ice sheets.

Using the best-available science and data, federal agencies developed a sea level rise planning tool to help state and local officials, community planners, and infrastructure managers understand possible future flood risks from sea level rise for use in planning decisions.

The online tool provides a series of maps with best-available elevation information for post-Sandy planning and rebuilding, in addition to supporting broader federal agency planning. While the tool does not tell communities or individuals *how* to rebuild, it can help inform decisions on how to *balance* the cost of rebuilding stronger and safer based on the amount of risk a community can tolerate over the long-term.

These maps are not intended to support regulatory flood hazard zone designation, insurance ratings, or other legal or regulatory constraints. Rather, these maps and services support planning that may help decision makers

Disaster Response Interpreter (DRI) Training

Description of Event:

The Maine Emergency Management Agency (MEMA), in partnership with the Maine Center on Deafness, will sponsor Disaster Response Interpreter training for certified sign language interpreters.

Course Details

This training and all course materials will be provided at no cost to the selected participants. Lunch and breaks will be provided. All other expenses are the responsibility of the student. We are an equal opportunity educational provider.

This full-day course will be taught in American Sign Language and is intended for professional sign language interpreters working in Maine who may be called upon to provide interpreting services after a disaster. All participants must be fluent in ASL. The training emphasizes basic knowledge of emergency response and recovery activities, and provides practice opportunities for interpreting at press conferences and shelters.

Topics include an overview of emergency management in Maine at the state and county levels, media and press protocols, shelter operations and recovery services, interpreter readiness, and procedures for interpreters trained in disaster response.

Accreditation

This program is offered for 0.8 Professional Studies CEUs at the Little/None content level through Maine Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf, Inc. (RID), an approved RID Certification Maintenance Program (CMP) Sponsor.

Required Prerequisites

1. Active Maine professional license as Certified Interpreter/Transliterater of American Sign Language and English or Certified Deaf Interpreter of American Sign Language and English
2. Active RID certification: CDI; NAD Level 3, 4 or 5; RID CI and CT, CSC, or IC and TC; NIC Generalist, Advanced or Master
3. Willingness to be called during an emergency response/disaster

Preferred (but not mandatory) Prerequisites

1. Minimum of 10 years of community sign language interpreting experience

2. Minimum of 5 years of medical, law enforcement and mental health emergency sign language interpreting experience
3. Affiliation with one or more organizations active in disasters
4. Completion of FEMA's IS-7, IS-100, IS-200, and IS-700 online, independent study courses

Selection Criteria

This course is limited to a maximum of 30 students. Preference will be given to Maine state-licensed interpreters holding national certification.

Applications must include copies of active licenses and certifications, as well as a list of relevant work experience.

Instructors

Course lead instructors are a professional interpreter and a deaf professional from Northern California Services for Deaf and Hard of Hearing.

Course adjunct instructors are the Individual Assistance Officer and Public Information Officer from MEMA and the State Relations Disaster Liaison from American Red Cross.

Maine Prepares Tips

Learn How To "Turn Off" Your House

August 24, 2013

Locate the main electric fuse or circuit-breaker box, water service shut-off, and natural gas or propane main shut-off, and mark them clearly. If you don't know how to turn them off, contact your utility company to learn how to do so safely. Teach family members when and how to turn off the utilities off. Keep the area around shut-off switches clear of clutter for each access.

Lessons Learned from the Boston Bombings

In July, several state and federal leaders joined Boston's police commissioner to testify before Congress about the events surrounding the Boston Marathon Bombings, specifically the lessons learned stemming from the response to the event. All testimony is available via a 2-hour video or as downloadable PDFs.

One serious aftereffect of that day was overtaxed cell-phone service that eventually failed. As a result, responders were forced to rely on radio service. Another result was the public's switch to social media to get news and updates, often by following official governmental feeds.

An article in Continuity Insights points out several unique aspects of the Boston area and the marathon that ultimately benefited the response:

- Businesses had mostly shut down due to the blocked roads and congestion, making roads less congested for emergency traffic;
- Boston has some of the premier medical facilities in the world;
- Staff from those facilities volunteered in medical tents at the marathon.

Based on these and many other factors mentioned in their congressional testimony, the RAND Office of External Affairs states: "We cannot assume, based on Boston's performance, that other U.S. cities are prepared to manage an event of similar or substantially greater magnitude."

The Boston Police Commissioner and the Massachusetts Undersecretary for Homeland Security both cite the strong relationships between various state, local, and federal agencies as well as the gaps in some relationships and information sharing mechanisms. Room for improvement in any jurisdictional emergency management plan is always something to investigate and strengthen.

AARP and FEMA Partner on Disaster Preparedness, Response and Recovery

WASHINGTON – Today (Aug 12, 2013), the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and AARP announced an agreement that will expand outreach around emergency preparedness for millions of older Americans. FEMA and AARP will work together to provide resources and services for older Americans with respect to disaster mitigation, preparedness, response and recovery operations in the event of natural, man-made or technological disasters.

"This agreement today puts into writing what FEMA and AARP already do in practice," said FEMA Administrator Craig Fugate. "FEMA and AARP will continue to support communities and individuals to build, sustain and improve our capability to prepare for, protect against, respond to, recover from and mitigate all hazards."

"We know that natural disasters don't discriminate by age, income, race, gender or anything else – they affect everyone and everything in their path," said AARP CEO A. Barry Rand. "We look forward to working with FEMA to educate American families on preparedness and help in recovery when disasters do strike."

This agreement strengthens the shared responsibility approach to emergency management and will improve access to information to help individuals, families and communities stay safe before, during and after an emergency or disaster. This is an opportunity for FEMA and AARP to collaborate on emergency preparedness communications including social media outreach, training and exercise and evaluation opportunities that will raise awareness and help individuals to take the necessary steps to be prepared for emergencies.

AARP has long been an active educator on emergency preparedness and ready to help when disaster strikes. Through the AARP Foundation, the Create the Good volunteer network, emergency planning toolkits and recovery efforts following recent natural disasters AARP has supported local communities as they prepare for and recover from the devastation caused by natural disasters. Hurricanes on the Horizon!

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association (NOAA) recently updated its 2013 Hurricane Season Outlook. Because the season has already produced several named storms in the Atlantic hurricane region, NOAA now predicts an above-average hurricane season, with the possibility of being very active.

This season is expected to produce 13-19 named storms, of which 6-9 are expected to become hurricanes and 3-5 to become major hurricanes. The season ends November 30 but peak season runs mid-August to late October.

While the Eastern Pacific hurricane season is expected to be below normal, it only takes one hurricane or tropical storm to cause a disaster which can occur whether a season is active or mostly quiet.

Therefore, people are urged to prepare for every hurricane season regardless of the outlook. In addition to having an emergency kit and family communications plan, you should:

- Learn your community evacuation route;
- Have paper maps on hand in case cellular networks are down;
- Cover your home's windows with storm shutters or plywood; and
- Get flood insurance protection.

Hurricanes can produce heavy rains that may cause extensive flooding. Homeowners insurance typically does not cover flood damage. To learn more about your flooding risk and how to protect yourself contact the Federal Insurance and Mitigation Administration.
