Hazard Mitigation Grant Program

Application Period Open

July 14, 2011

Maine Emergency Management Agency is accepting grant applications through September 30 for the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP). Maine has received funding from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for eligible mitigation projects in the wake of major disaster declarations in the past year.

Hazard mitigation grants provide funding for eligible construction, acquisition, relocation or related projects that will help the jurisdiction avoid future damages from natural disasters.

Applications must be received by 5:00 pm, Friday, September 30, 2011.

Communities seeking HMGP funds must be participating in a FEMA-approved Hazard Mitigation plan, and compliant with the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). The proposed project must seek to address repetitive damages, and the proposed solution must be cost-beneficial. That is, the cost of the project must be roughly equal to or less than the historical cost to repair previous damages at the site.

Communities must also provide a 25% cost-share. Community Development Block Grant funds are eligible to be considered as cost share. Cost share can also be provided by volunteer services, or other in-kind resources.

Technical assistance is available to assist applicants as they prepare grant requests. MEMA conducts periodic workshops to guide applicants through the process, and can also provide one-on-one assistance.

Emergency Management

Emergency management is the managerial function charged with creating the framework within which communities reduce vulnerability to hazards and cope with disasters.

Agency for Toxic Substances & Disease Registry

ATSDR is the principal federal public health agency involved with hazardous waste issues. The agency is responsible for preventing or reducing the harmful effects of exposure to hazardous substances on human health and quality of life. ATSDR is part of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. The agency was created by the Superfund law in 1980. That law started a program to find and clean up the most dangerous hazardous waste sites. ATSDR was formally organized in 1985 and is responsible for carrying out the health-related parts of the Superfund law and of other laws that protect the public from hazardous wastes and environmental spills of hazardous substances. It is responsible for determining, as best as possible, whether people have harmful health effects from their exposure to hazardous substances.

ATSDR educates doctors, other health care professionals, and communities about the health effects of hazardous substances and how to lessen their exposure to hazardous substances. For example, the agency has developed educational programs that teach children and parents was to reduce lead exposure. ATSDR conducts and funds studies on hazardous substances.

ATSDR provides technical support and advice to other federal agencies, states and local governments that respond to accidental spills or releases of hazardous substances, such as from train wrecks, fires, and other emergencies. The agency has published documents called "Toxicological Profiles" on many of common materials which are available for download as a PDF file.

What Seniors Should Know About Disaster Assistance

FEMA, June 30, 2011

Seniors need not worry about losing Social Security and Medicare benefits if they receive federal disaster assistance. Disaster assistance grants are not considered taxable income and will not affect Social Security or Medicare.

The first step for seniors or anyone else seeking federal aid is to register with FEMA:

- By **phone**, call **1-800-621-FEMA (3362)** from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. EDT. Assistance is available in many languages. Those who are deaf, hard of hearing or have a speech disability may use **TTY 1-800-462-7585**;
- By computer, go online to www.DisasterAssistance.gov;
- By smartphone or tablet, use m.fema.gov.

Seniors and others who apply for FEMA help may receive a disaster loan application from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). They should fill it out and return it. Although no one is obligated to take a loan, those who fail to complete the SBA application may disqualify themselves for other types of assistance.

Some seniors with paid-off mortgages may wonder why they would want a long-term government loan. But if they need funds to restore their homes to pre-disaster condition, a low-interest loan from the federal government might be the best solution. The SBA offers disaster loans up to \$200,000 to repair or replace homes and up to \$40,000 to homeowners and renters for personal property losses. Interest rates are as low as 2.688 percent.

In addition to applying for federal aid, those who are insured should file claims with their insurance companies. FEMA cannot provide funding for insured losses. Even when survivors are insured, FEMA may be able to provide some assistance when insurance settlements are delayed, settlements are insufficient to meet disaster-related needs, or claimants have exhausted their coverage for Additional Living Expenses.



MEMA State and Federal Training Program Authorization Process



Hurricanes: Inland Freshwater Flooding

When it comes to hurricanes, wind speeds do not tell the whole story. Hurricanes produce storm surges, tornadoes, and often the most deadly of all, **inland freshwater flooding**.

While storm surge is always a potential threat, many more people have died from inland freshwater flooding. Inland flooding can be a major threat to communities hundreds of miles from the coast as heavy rain falls from these huge tropical air masses. *Of the 56 people who perished in 1999 from Hurricane Floyd, 50 drowned due to inland flooding.*

In 1972, Hurricane Agnes produced floods in the Northeast United States which contributed to 122 deaths and \$6.4 billion in damages. And in 1955, long after the winds from Hurricane Diane had subsided, the storm brought inland flooding to Pennsylvania, New York, and New England contributing to nearly 200 deaths and \$4.2 billion in damages.

Freshwater floods accounted for more than half of U.S. tropical cyclone deaths from 1975-2004 years and **more than 75% of the children killed by tropical cyclones**. Flooding is also the reason that 63% of U.S. tropical cyclone deaths during that period occurred in inland counties. *At least 23% of U.S. tropical cyclone deaths are people who were attempting to drive through flooded roadways. "[Turn around, don't drown](#)".*

Here in New England, tropical systems can combine with mid-latitude weather systems (extra-tropical) to produce very heavy rains and flooding, even when the hurricane or tropical storm remains well offshore. In fact in 1996, a coastal storm that was fed tropical moisture from the circulation around Hurricane Lili (well offshore) produced from 4 to 19 inches of rain across southern and central New Hampshire and southwestern Maine and was responsible for one drowning death.

Here are some tips to protect you and your home from flooding.

1. Develop a flood emergency action plan

2. Determine whether you live in a flood-prone area
3. If flooding is possible, move valuable items from the basements or first floor to higher floors in your home. Have a checklist of these items in your emergency action plan.
4. Keep abreast of road conditions through the news media, local officials and the MaineDOT 511 travel information service. Move to a safe area before access is cut off by flood water.
5. If advised to evacuate, do so immediately.
6. Do not attempt to drive through a flooded roadway. *As little as six inches of rapidly moving water can cause some vehicles to be pushed off the roadway.*

Also, If you live in a flood-prone area, consider purchasing flood insurance. Flood damage is not usually covered by homeowners insurance policies. Do Not make assumptions; check your policy.

The BMAP is an innovative training opportunity being offered by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Office for Bombing Prevention. This program is designed to increase Public & Private Sector awareness of the activities and a material associated with bomb making, including homemade explosives, and provides audience-appropriate awareness information on suspicious behavior, hazardous materials, precursor chemicals, and other bomb making related information.

The BMAP is being provided as part of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's National IED Prevention & Awareness Campaign, and was developed in cooperation with the Federal Bureau of Investigation. BMAP is presented as a one-day Train-the-Trainer course that prepares participants to take the information back to their organizations, where they can in turn share the knowledge and materials with fellow co-workers. BMAP is not designed to train bomb detection and handling personnel, but is geared towards individuals who may be the first to encounter bomb making activities (e.g..Planning, Supply Purchases/Acquisition, Production, Testing, Deployment, etc). Self-Study Courses in Homeland Security

The Naval Postgraduate School Center for Homeland Defense and Security offers non-credit, self-study courses online. These courses are developed by the NPS CHDS teaching faculty and are derived from course content (lecture material and course readings) from the Center's homeland security master's degree curriculum. The courses, offered at no cost, are designed for homeland defense and security professionals who wish to enhance their understanding of key homeland security concepts and require the flexibility of self-paced instruction. NPS does not provide graduate credit for the courses; however, participants are encouraged to check with their professional associations regarding continuing education units/credits. Upon completing each course, participants can download a record of completion.

Six Courses Currently Available:

- * Terrorist Financing and State Response
- * Intelligence for Homeland Security: Organizational and Policy Challenges
- * Homeland Security in Israel
- * The Global Jihadi Threat
- * Critical Infrastructure: Vulnerability Analysis and Protection
- * Technology for Homeland Security: Inspection and Detection Technologies

Terrorist Financing and State Response course examines exactly how far we have come in understanding how terrorist raise, store and transfer funds. It also evaluates and challenges the U.S. government and international community in responding to this problem.

Intelligence for Homeland Security: Organizational and Policy Challenges course examines key questions and issues facing the U.S. intelligence community and its role in homeland security and homeland defense. Course reference materials will provide an overview of diverse intelligence disciplines and how the intelligence community operates.

Homeland Security in Israel focuses on a range of preventive and response policies followed by Israel in the context of its counterterrorism and homeland defense policies and on the legal, organizational and strategic environments that affect Israeli policies before moving to discuss policies in the context of the response agencies, medical system and the military's Homefront Command.

The Global Jihadi Threat course is provided in five modules and provides a brief introduction of the religion, its early history and schisms, the role of Jihad, Islam's relationship to the West and that of individual Muslims

within Western counties and the ideologies of Islamic extremism.

Critical Infrastructure: Vulnerability Analysis and Protection develops a network theory of vulnerability analysis and risk assessment called "model-based vulnerability analysis" used to extract the critical nodes from each sector, (referencing PDD-63 and the National Strategy for Protection of Critical Infrastructure and Key Assets) model the nodes' vulnerabilities by representing them in the form of a fault-tree, and then applying fault and financial risk reduction techniques.

Technology for Homeland Security: Inspection and Detection Technologies course is designed to provide the knowledge and skills to make students more effective technology users and help them recognize opportunities where the application of technology solutions can provide a strategic advantage and therefore make a contribution to homeland security.

Access to the Self-study Courses is granted to local, tribal, state and federal U.S. government officials; members of the U.S. military; corporate homeland security managers or contractors or educators; and students currently enrolled in homeland security degree programs.

Damage Assessment Thresholds

MEMA, July 07, 2011

Effective, July 1, 2011, FEMA has indicated that the new population data from the 2010 census will be the basis for determining State and County thresholds for future disaster declarations. The 2010 census indicates that Cumberland County population has grown by 6% to 281,674 from 265,611 reported in 2000. When formulated out, in order to be considered for Federal Public Assistance (PA) in event of a disaster, the county's new threshold is \$921,074, which is up from the previous amount of \$868,551. Additionally, in order for the county to be considered eligible for Federal PA, the State's new threshold is \$1,726,869, (previously \$1,657,400), which is the amount of estimated damage assessment as reported on Form 7's, necessary for the Governor to request federal assistance. The 2010 census population for the State of Maine is 1,328,361 up from 1,274,915 (4.2% increase).
