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FEMA, National Commission on Children and Disasters Announce New Partnership to Promote Fire Safety Awareness for Families

**Announcement Comes as FEMA
Releases New Report Showing Children
under Four at Growing Risk of Death or
Injury in Fires**

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- With home fires on the rise in winter months, and a new study showing that young children are at an especially high risk of getting seriously injured or dying in residential fires, today the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the National Commission on Children and Disasters are announcing a new public awareness campaign to help keep children and families safer from the threat of home fires.

As part of this effort, today FEMA's U.S. Fire Administration is releasing a new report on the risks fires pose to children. The report, which is based on the latest available data released by the National Center for Health Statistics, found that young children face the greatest - and a growing - risk of death or serious injury in home fires, with 52 percent of all child fire deaths in 2007 involving children under the age of four, a slight increase from the most recent study previously conducted in 2004.

"This latest report reveals a deeply troubling trend and should serve as a wake-up

call for all of us," said FEMA Administrator Craig Fugate. "The bottom line is that one of the greatest threats our youngest kids may face during the winter months exist in their homes. It's critical that all families are aware of these risks and take the simple steps now to prevent fires due to cooking, heating or other causes at home. These deaths are preventable, and working together we can educate each other and save lives."

"During the past decade of unprecedented disasters, the needs of kids were too often left behind in disaster planning," said Mark Shriver, Chairman, National Commission on Children and Disasters. "We not only hope this partnership helps better protect children from home fires, but also puts a spotlight on the unique needs of kids when disasters strike. We're grateful that Administrator Fugate has demonstrated such strong leadership and made significant progress for protecting children in a very short time."

In addition, the report found that:

- Deaths from fires and burns were the second leading cause of accidental deaths not related to transportation,

Sugarloaf Resort Exercise Turns Into Realty

Included in last months issue of First Responder News was a story regarding a unique full scale exercise conducted November 7th, 2010 at Sugarloaf USA Ski Resort in Carrabasset Valley, Maine. On December 29, 2010 less than 2 months later the scenario became a real world event.

This incident included many of the same members of the area first responder, ski patrol, emergency management and hospital communities. Further proving the point that practice makes perfect and these exercise opportunities can be invaluable.

The November full scale exercise was sponsored by the Maine Emergency Management Agency in conjunction with the Franklin County Emergency Management Agency and Sugarloaf USA. Over 270 responders, ski patrol, victims, and other participants simulated a chair lift accident with 30 victims injured and over 100 victims needing to be evacuated from the chair lift. The exercise planning process of 18 months included a tabletop and functional exercise and several training sessions to prepare for the event.

The incident occurred on the Spillway East chair lift, located above a trail that shares its name, toward the center of the resort. According to Sugarloaf officials, at 10:30 a.m., a rope derailment occurred near Tower 8, about halfway up the lift line. The rope derailment occurs when the cable, which supports the chairs, comes off of the pulley-wheel system.

Three chairs, still attached to the cable, fell roughly 30 feet to the ground. Members of the ski patrol responded, transporting eight injured people down the mountain to waiting Northstar EMS ambulances. one person brought to the hospital was transported by medical helicopter LifeFlight to Maine Medical Center in Portland. Others were treated in the Franklin Memorial Hospital emergency room.

Similarities between the exercise and real world event are amazing according to Franklin County Emergency Management Agency Director Tim Hardy. Hardy states "most of the key command staff that participated in the exercise assumed the identical role and actions during the real event.

Here is a handful of the similarities;

- Sugarloaf officials did not have an exact count of the number of people evacuated but estimated that more than 150 people were on the lift when the incident occurred, the exercise had 100 people on the lift needing evacuation.
- The exercise scenario had included the fact that it was during Christmas vacation and the resort would have

during Christmas vacation and the resort would have a higher volume of skiers than average, this was the exact real world case.

- Farmington Fire Chief Terry Bell who is in charge of the County Incident Management Assistance Team vehicle responded to the Sugarloaf incident for communications assistance along with EMA Director Tim Hardy both played the same role in the exercise.
- Carrabasset Valley Police Chief Scott Nichols assumed the role of Incident Commander and set up command post operations in the police station at the foot of the mountain as the as done in the exercise.
- Carrabasset Valley Fire Chief Courtney Knapp served as the operations chief and used the Mountain Fire Station for operations same as the exercise.
- Ski Patrol Director Ben Befroschia and ski patroller Earl Connor ran the victim treatment and transport section for both the exercise and real event.

The event gain a considerable amount of national media attention because a CNN news staff member was on the lift when the incident occurred. He had called into the news room from his cell phone while still trapped on the lift. CNN went live with the story and provided many updates throughout the day, prompting many of the other national news stations to compete.

Sugarloaf USA was a key player in the exercise and provided a god deal of support through the entire exercise and training process. The lesson for all responders to understand is practice will make perfect and a winning situation for all involved.

- Boys are at higher-risk of dying from fires than girls;
- Between 2006 and 2008, smoke alarms were not present in at least 23 percent of residential fires;
- African-American children are at an increased risk of fire deaths; and
- Low-income children are at greatest risk of exposure to home fires.

"Children are one of our most vulnerable populations. Through diverse partnerships we can highlight the dangers which are threatening children throughout the country," said FEMA Acting U.S. Fire Administrator Glenn Gaines. "Through reports, such as this one, we can target specific types of hazards to keep children safe from fires."

To help families protect their homes and loved ones, especially young children, from fires, FEMA, the U.S. Fire Administration and the National Commission on Children and Disasters are asking families to take simple steps now to prevent fires in their residences, and partnering with leading organizations across the fire, emergency medical services, public health and emergency management fields to get the message out.

To provide families with important tips about fire safety and lists of additional resources, FEMA is launching online and social media tools, including:

- An updated web page dedicated to children's fire safety, including tips on how to prevent the two leading causes of fire during the winter months: cooking and heating;
- A widget that will link to this website and resources;

In accordance with new guidance from FEMA overnight policy for training classes have changed.


- The new mileage distance for single overnight lodging is 65 miles from place of employment.
- MEMA will continue the policy of allowing night before lodging for 100 miles from place of employment.
- All mileage will be calculated using computer based mapping and travel distance.

This guidance is effective immediately; MEMA reserves the right to modify this guidance based upon circumstances such as road conditions, etc.

State of Maine Communications Interoperability Plan (SCIP)

National Emergency Communications Plan Goal 2

The Department of Homeland Security's Office of emergency communications (OEC) developed the National emergency communications Plan (NECP) to establish goals and priorities for improving emergency communications across the United States. The NECP's three goals establish a baseline level of interoperable emergency communications during routine, day-to-day incidents, and for responses to significant, large-scale disasters. NECP Goal 2 focuses on the demonstration of response-level emergency communications by all counties or county-equivalents during routine incidents or events.

Importance of Goal 2 Demonstration

OEC is working with States to measure NECP Goals through an assessment process that is designed to improve the understanding of emergency communications and focus improvement activities, such as:

- Identifying emergency communications needs
- Developing plans for future emergency communications investments
- Targeting resources and assistance to where support is needed most.

Goal 2 Data Collection and Reporting

Every county or county-equivalent will report on two types of information related to response level emergency communications: capabilities and performance.

Capability data is based on the foundational elements described in the **SAFECOM Interoperability Continuum**.

Performance information collection focuses on the ability of primary operational leadership to communicate, manage resources, and make timely decisions during an incident, exercise, or planned event.

OEC is working with the Statewide Interoperability Coordinators (SWIC) to support the Goal 2 data collection process. SWICs will provide State and local personnel with information on reporting requirements, including the availability of a web-based tool developed by OEC to make data entry and reporting easy.

MEMA will provide training and more information in the coming months.

The Response-Level Communications tool is a useful device for evaluating events and incidents to support Goal 2 data collection and any future evaluation efforts.

How to Modify your FCC License for Narrowband

The Narrowband tool was created to assist local agencies in modifying their FCC licenses for narrowband. The information shared during this overview is outlined below:

- The narrow banding tool provides a step-by-step guide which allows licensees to modify their own licenses. This saves the licensee money that they normally would pay to hire a technologist to modify their license.
- To ensure that public safety agencies were aware of the narrow banding mandate, Maine conducted outreach to public safety agencies through the Maine Emergency Management agency website, email, mail, and public service Narrowband DVD.
